

...from Fr. Gerard

They shall name him Emmanuel, which means "God is with us."

I am not very good at small talk or cocktail party chit chat. Part of it is that such conversation does not come naturally to me. Secondarily, if I am somewhere where I am not dressed in clerical clothing and my profession is not obvious to a stranger, I will get what for me and many priests is a loaded question, "So what do you do?" I say it is a loaded question because once I say I am a priest, I know that there will be a follow-up which can be a very inspiring ministerial moment, a cringeworthy account of corporal punishment from a nun or a mixture of anger and pain as a result of a more serious experience with the church and its ministers. I mention all of this because this quote from today's gospel reminded me of a recent incognito moment for me.

As I was getting my haircut one afternoon, the woman cutting my hair asked if I was off for the weekend or did I work weekends. "No, I work weekends," I said. She asked what I did, and I waited to answer until the scissors were not so close to my ear. After I told her I was a priest, she told me she was reading and translating her grandmother's New Testament written in old Greek She said that it called Jesus a strange name. When I asked what it was, she said, "Emmanuel." I wondered how she could not know this. It could not have been her first encounter with the word/name "Emmanuel." But rather than pass judgment, I explained it was not the proper name of our Lord but rather a statement about who he is — God with us. The conversation did not go much further, but I continued to think about the exchange. And I wondered to myself, how many of us take the name "Emmanuel" for granted - more than the name itself, but the statement of identity that it proclaims, "God is with us." As we enter these joyful days of Christmas, it is good for us to bring that simple statement to our prayer. God is with us; we are not alone in the extraordinary moments of our lives. God is with us in the sacraments of the church, in sacred scripture and in our brothers and sisters of faith. It was the knowledge that God was with him that allowed Saint Joseph to take Mary into his life, despite his uncertainty. And it is the knowledge that God is with us every day of our lives that helps us to meet the challenges, decisions and mysteries of our lives. EMMANUEL — do not be afraid.

WELCOME HOME – Family members, friends, college students, and military personnel will travel great distances to be with loved ones this week. In those gatherings, they will feel at home and maybe even recognize the presence of Christ in the "home" they create together. In that same spirit, many will return home to Saint Rose of Lima this week. For the last several weeks, we have been preparing ourselves and our parish community to be a worthy home for the Lord. And so, it is now our opportunity to welcome Him. In a particular way, we welcome him as he comes within the broken-hearted, the estranged, the sorrowful, the poor, the afraid, the tired and the lonely. During these Christmas days, may all be welcomed as Christ.

Christmas 2025

To the People of God of the Diocese of Rockville Centre:

Merry Christmas!

Throughout this year, we have marked many significant milestones in the life of the Church leading us to the Lord's Nativity and this holy season of Christmas, most especially the passing of Pope Francis at Easter and the election of Pope Leo XIV in May.

What a gift it has been to walk these months with our new Holy Father, to learn from his teaching, and witness his example.

On October 4th, the Memorial of Saint Francis of Assisi, Pope Leo released his first Apostolic Exhortation, *Dilexit Te - I Have Loved You*. It is a profound meditation on love for the poor and speaks powerfully to the mystery of the Lord's Birth and the grace of this season.

The Holy Father reminds us: "The Gospel shows us that poverty marked every aspect of Jesus' life. From the moment he entered the world, Jesus knew the bitter experience of rejection. The Evangelist Luke tells how Joseph and Mary, who was about to give birth, arrived in Bethlehem, and then adds, poignantly, that 'there was no place for them in the inn' (Lk 2:7). Jesus was born in humble surroundings and laid in a manger; then, to save him from being killed, they fled to Egypt (cf. Mt 2:13-15). At the dawn of his public ministry, after announcing in the synagogue of Nazareth that the year of grace which would bring joy to the poor was fulfilled in him, he was driven out of town (cf. Lk 4:14-30). He died as an outcast, led out of Jerusalem to be crucified (cf. Mk 15:22). Indeed, that is how Jesus' poverty is best described: he experienced the same exclusion that is the lot of the poor, the outcast of society. Jesus is a manifestation of this *privilegium pauperum*. He presented himself to the world not only as a poor Messiah, but also as the Messiah of and for the poor." (n. 19)

Before these words of Pope Leo, we recall the wonderful truth: Christ became poor so that we who are poor might become rich (cf. 2 Cor. 8:9). This is the good news of Christmas. We are not alone. We are not left to ourselves. A Savior has come - Christ the Lord.

As we celebrate the Christmas season, we remember with Pope Leo that "Christian holiness often flourishes in the most forgotten and wounded places of humanity." (n. 76)

How beautifully the followers of Christ have responded to the cry of the poor and looked with love upon the most vulnerable among us. As we rejoice in Christ's Birth, we renew our commitment to love others as he has loved us.

On Sunday, December 28th at the Cathedral of Saint Agnes, on the Feast of the Holy Family of Jesus, Mary, and Joseph, we will conclude our Jubilee Year of Hope.

We thank both Pope Francis and Pope Leo XIV for igniting hope within our families, the global mission of the Church, and the human family, and we contemplate the light and grace that radiates from the refugee Holy Family (73) and that radiates to every family.

Our Catholic biblical and sacramental worship, especially at the Catholic Mass, focuses and ignites both our global mission to the poor (n. 42) and our humble openness to being evangelized by the poor (n. 102), the treasures of our Church (n. 38).

Merry Christmas and Happy New Year to you and your families!

May the Light and love of the Christ Child animate and guide our global Catholic missionary spirit this Christmas and throughout the New Year.

THE FIRST AMERICAN POPE

On Thursday, May 8th 2025, Cardinal Robert Francis Prevost, O.S.A., became the first American and the first Augustinian Pope. He was born on September 14, 1955, in Chicago to Louis Marius Prevost and Mildred Martínez. He has two older brothers, Louis Martín and John Joseph, and is of African, French, Italian, and Spanish descent.

After high school he attended Villanova University earning a degree in Mathematics (1977). He then entered the Order of St. Augustine and studied theology first at the Catholic Theological Union in Chicago (1978–82) and then Canon Law in Rome (1982–87) where he was ordained a priest on June 19, 1982.

From 1988–99 he served in the Augustinian mission in Trujillo, Peru, both in various Augustinian offices: prior of the community, formation director, and instructor for professed members, and for the diocese as judicial vicar and professor of Canon Law, Patristics, and Moral Theology at the Major Seminary, all the while doing pastoral ministry for Saint Rita parish in a poor suburb of the city.

In 1999 he returned to Chicago to serve as Provincial Prior and then Prior General of the whole Augustinian Order (2001–13). He returned to Peru and in 2015 Pope Francis made him Bishop of Chiclayo. Pope Leo claimed that "The part of my ministry that most shaped my life was Peru. I was there for over 20 years total."

In 2023 Pope Francis named him a Cardinal to head the Curia office for choosing new bishops. As Pope Leo later explained, "he called me specifically because he didn't want someone from the Roman Curia to take on this role. He wanted a missionary. He wanted someone from outside. He wanted someone who would come in with a different perspective and assist him in a very specific ministry."

Leo's life experience of service to the Church both in administration as pastor, prior, provincial, Prior General, Bishop and Cardinal and in his missionary work as pastor, teacher and friend of the poor, well suits him now to face the challenges of his new role as Pope.



POPE LEO'S COAT OF ARMS

Pope Leo XIV's coat of arms reflects his desire to promote love for Jesus, veneration of Mary, and unity within the Church. It embodies both his personal faith and his Augustinian spiritual heritage.

Behind the shield appears the papal silver mitre symbolizing his papal office. It has three gold bands reminiscent of the traditional elaborate bejeweled triple tiara (crown) no longer worn by popes. It also has two fluttering red streamers fringed with gold and

adorned with gold crosses. The crossed gold and silver Petrine keys linked by a red cord symbolize his papal authority (Mt 16:19).

The shield is divided diagonally into two sections, the upper blue background recalls the heights of the heavens and displays a lily or fleur-de-lis symbolizing the Blessed Virgin Mary. The lower half has a light background displaying an image familiar to the Order of Saint Augustine: a closed book with a heart pierced by an arrow, recalling St. Augustine's personal encounter with God's Word using the phrase: "You have pierced my heart with your Word." The Latin motto, "In Illo uno unum" ("In the one Christ we are one"), is taken from St. Augustine's sermon on the Exposition on Psalm 127, explaining that "although we Christians are many, in the one Christ we are one."

First American-Born Pope: The first pope born in the USA.

Dual Citizenship: Holds US and Peruvian citizenship due to extensive missionary work in Peru during the 1980s and 1990s.

Math Whiz: Earned a Bachelor's in mathematics from Villanova University in 1977.

White Sox (and Bears) Fan: Lifelong supporter of the Chicago White Sox, he attended Game 1 of their 2005 World Series victory.

Tennis Enthusiast: An amateur tennis player, he's expressed interest in hitting with proffesional players.

Multilingual: Speaks English, Spanish, Italian, French, Portuguese, German, and reads Latin.

Wordle Player: Plays Wordle and Words with Friends with his brothers. Car Enthusiast: Loves driving long distances and fixing cars, a skill he used as a missionary in Peru.

First Augustinian Pope: First pope from the Order of Saint Augustine.

Canon Law Expert: Holds a doctorate in canon law from Rome, with a thesis on Augustinian leadership roles.



IRA Charitable Rollover Qualified Charitable Distribution

This is a unique opportunity to make a charitable contribution through a direct IRA transfer while reducing your adjusted gross income, even under the new July 2025 tax rules.

If you would like to make a gift to St. Rose of Lima using your IRA:

- It must be a direct transfer.
- The IRA owner must be age 70½ or older at the time of the distribution.
- The donor must keep the QCD within the annual aggregate limit.
- The QCD must be processed by December 31 to qualify for tax benefits in that tax year. (Donors should start the process in early December to ensure ample time.)

The best way for you to start is with your IRA custodian. Tell them you want to make a "qualified charitable distribution." In most cases, you will only have to fill out a simple form.

VERY IMPORTANT: Your gift must go directly from your IRA to our Parish. If you receive the money first, you will be taxed on it like any other distribution.



WHAT IT TAKES TO MAKE A QCD



The QCD must come from a Traditional or Inherited IRA.



Beneficiary must be at least 70 1/2.



The distribution must go directly to a qualified charity.



You must receive a confirmation letter from the charity that states no goods or services were received in exchange for the contribution.


